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APPENDIX A: DETAILED TABLES

This appendix accompanies the report, 'Has Brexit Been A Success? The Public's Perspective'.

It includes the detailed results of 12 waves of survey research on attitudes towards Brexit that have been conducted among members of the NatCen Panel, a unique mixed-mode random probability panel maintained by NatCen Social Research (Cabrera-Alvarez et al, 2016; Jessop, 2018). All of the members of this panel were first interviewed for the annual British Social Attitudes survey (Curtice et al., 2020), the respondents to which were chosen at random, and who then agreed to undertake further short interviews, either online or over the phone.

The data for each wave have been weighted so that they reflect the known demographic character of the population and the distribution of responses to key variables on the original British Social Attitudes surveys. Details of both weighted and unweighted bases are supplied.
